The National Personal Finance Challenge

The National Personal Finance Challenge (NPFC) is a nationwide competition that offers high school students the opportunity to build and demonstrate their knowledge in the concepts of earning income, spending, saving, investing, managing credit, and managing risk.

In the first round, competitors complete a 30-question online challenge. In the national finals students use what they have learned from the six areas of knowledge to create a financial plan for a fictitious family scenario, which they then present to an esteemed panel of judges. The top scoring teams advance to compete for the national championship title in an oral Quiz Bowl.

Over 18,000 students across the US participated 2025 in the NPFC, and CEE's goal is 50,000 annual participants by 2030. We continue our efforts to make the program accessible to a diverse set of participants; in 2024 over 30% of competitors were students from diverse backgrounds.

She has contributed to *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal*, and has appeared on ABC's *Good Morning America, PBS NewsHour*, CNN, and NPR.
